Reminders:

Punctuality

School starts at 8:45am. Please arrive on time to complete early morning work, respond to next steps or read with an adult. Arriving 15 minutes late each day equates to over an hour a week. Over the school year this is the equivalent of almost 39 hours of missed learning – almost 11 school days!

Attendance

The expectation is 96%. Please ensure that your children attend school pupils with no absence are 1.3 times more likely to achieve age related expectations, and 3.1 times more likely to achieve above age related expectations, than pupils that missed 10-15% of all sessions.

School Dinners

All primary school children who attend state schools in London will receive free school meals for the full academic year.



School Uniform:

For Girls

Jade round neck sweatshirt with school logo, dark grey skirt, pinafore or trousers and white polo shirt (with or without school logo). In summer girls can wear a green and white check dress.

For Boys

Jade round neck sweatshirt with school logo, dark grey trousers and white polo shirt (with or without school logo). In summer dark grey smart shorts can be worn. No **joggers**, jeans or leggings to be worn as trousers.

Footwear

<u>All black school shoes</u> – trainers, flip-flops or backless sandals or shoes are not acceptable.

Children must wear dark grey socks and tights.

Girls must wear conservative hair accessories in green, black and white without embellishments.

Small ear studs, basic watch allowed and religious jewelry (e.g. Kara) allowed.

For PE

A t-shirt of your class colour (no football shirts) and black shorts or bottoms.

PE:



PE lessons are <u>every Thursday</u> – children must come to school wearing the PE kit.

PE kit should be as follows:

- Plain crew neck t-shirt in the colour of the child's class red, blue, yellow or green.
- Plain black jogging bottoms or shorts in summer and a plain black sweatshirt for colder weather.
- Trainers will be required for all PE lessons.
- Earrings must be removed for PE lessons.
- Long hair must be tied up
- -No studded football boots

Behaviour:

The primary aim of Cranbrook Primary School is that every member of the school community feels valued and respected and that each person is treated fairly and well.

We expect all of our children to uphold the school values: respect, kindness, resilience and equality

Cranbrook Primary School aims to promote an environment where everyone feels happy, safe, and secure and where pupil wellbeing is a key focus for all staff.

The school expects every member of the school community to behave in a considerate way towards others. We are a Rights Respecting school and we have embedded them into our curriculum and ethos to ensure our children are aware of them and understand that these rights are universal.

Behaviour

This year in Year 6 we have reintroduced house points! Giving children the opportunity to work together in their class colours to win a treat at the end of the half term. This will run alongside merits.

Homework:

Children are expected to complete homework weekly

– There will be a Maths piece, an English piece
(Reading and SPAG) and spellings to practise for the week.

The homework is set on a Thursday and is due to be returned on a Tuesday written out in their books. If homework cannot be completed, a signed letter must be provided by the parent / carer.

Please support your children in completing their homework and leave a comment in their book if they need further support with any work – we will be happy to provide additional help if they need it!

Ensure that they write in full sentences with neat handwriting and presentation. Show all calculations and working out for maths.

Curriculum:

- This term, our theme is Oppressors and Empowerment.
- We will be studying the history of the slave trade, from its earliest origins to more modern forms of slavery as well as the abolishment of the slave trade.
- We will also spend a half term exploring map skills, where children will learn about different types of maps and their key features, read Cartesian coordinates, understand grid reference symbols and use the 8 points of the compass.
- In RE we are exploring what it means to be a Sikh making comparisons with our own beliefs and considering what unites us as a community.
- In PSHE we will learn about racism, social media and managing money.
- For Science, we will learn about the circulatory system and what it means to be healthy and take care of our body.

Year 6 residential – Summer 2025

- Some children will have the opportunity to take part in a residential trip to Maes y Lade, Wales. This will help them to gain confidence and independence.
- Those attending will leave on Monday 23rd June and return on Friday 27th June 2025.
- They will participate in a range of adventurous activities, such as climbing, water sports and caving. The children will also be expected to help out with chores and clearing away after meals, to teach them responsibility.

Children who do not attend the week residential to Wales will have the chance to attend the one day residential to Stubbers in Upminster on Thursday 26th June 2025.

Once coaches for transport have been confirmed letters will be sent out via school ping to sign up for the trips.

Secondary School Applications

For children transferring from primary to secondary, applications should be made via eAdmissions at www.redbridge.gov.uk/eadmissions

The deadline for secondary schools' admissions is **Thursday 31**st **October 2024.** So, please ensure that you apply by that date.

 It is important to name six preferred schools when making the application. If you don't apply by the deadline, your application will not be considered until after all the on-time applications have been processed.

SATs 2024 - 2025

SATs will commence the week beginning Monday 12th of May.

SATs Test Schedule

- Monday, 12th May 2025: English Grammar, Punctuation, and Spelling (Papers 1 and 2).
- Tuesday, 13th May 2025: English Reading Comprehension.
- Wednesday, 14th May 2025: Mathematics (Papers 1 and 2).
- Thursday, 15th May 2025: Mathematics (Paper 3).

(All papers are marked externally)

Writing and Science is teacher assessed.

Please avoid trips away just before and during this important assessment period.

SATs – Reading Test

Consists of:


- A comprehension based test on a reading booklet containing three texts. The texts will be a mix of fiction and non-fiction.
- There will be approximately 35 questions to answer in total in 1 hour (roughly 20mins per text).
- There will be a range of retrieval, inference and explanation questions to answer.

Maths Tests

 Test 1 – Arithmetic test (40 Marks) – lasting 30 minutes

(Four operations, fractions, decimals and percentages)

- Test 2 a reasoning paper (35 Marks) lasting 40 minutes
- Test 3 a reasoning paper (35 Marks) lasting 40 minutes



Please avoid letting your child practise/revise using previous SATs papers.

- We use previous SATs papers as a way of checking the children's progress as we move through the year and the learning.
- This can help us to identify gaps in knowledge and areas to focus in further depth when using unseen papers.
- It benefits the children if when they sit the assessments they are showing their true ability at that moment in time otherwise it can be disheartening for children if they later sit papers that they have not had access to and they do not perform as well.


Writing and Science Results

Science: We assess the children throughout the course of the year.

Writing: Teachers make a judgement based on the child's progress, contributions and completed tasks throughout the year. Which is why it is important that the children are practising their writing skills at home. In case of being selected for Borough moderation, judgements will be checked externally.

How to support your child's learning at home

- Ensure your child completes their homework
- Assist with homework whenever possible.
- Let us know how much input you are giving when necessary.
- It is essential that you continue to support them with their times tables, calculation methods and key number facts.
- Read, read and read some more discuss reading, model a passion for literature!
- Discuss current affairs.
- Ensure you discuss any social/behavioural issues which may arise.
- Try to visit local landmarks, museums and exhibitions.
- Use interactive websites to support your child's learning, such as RMEasimaths, Timestable Rockstars and Collins ebooks— all links can be found on the school website.
- We strongly recommend the CGP books, which we have available at a price of £30.

- It's your choice Don't let others dictate when the right time is to use tech.
- **Stay involved** make time to communicate, talk about what they are doing. What do they enjoy? What makes them laugh?
- Don't quiz them have regular conversations. What's their favourite app?
 What is the best site to learn new things from?
- Join in watch them play a game and join in. Who are they playing with? Do they know the other players?
- **'Show me how...'** ask their advice to help you with your privacy settings, who you should add as a friend, are there any risks?
- Lead by example children learn as much from watching as they do from being told not to do something, so model good behaviour
- Reassure them tell them that they won't get in trouble and that you are always there to help.

- eSafety is taught in school.










- ZIP IT Keep your personal stuff private and think about what you say and do online

- FLAG IT Flag up with someone you trust if anything upsets you or if someone asks to meet you offline.
